Infants A & B – Dreamers ~ Theme: Dreamers in Never, Never Land

Jr. Toddlers – Travelers ~ Theme: A Visit to Wonderland

These and so many other key experiences will support your child's early learning adventures in our Traveler's Classroom.



Sr. Toddlers – Adventurers ~ Theme: A Visit to Mother Goose Land

A focus on listening skills will ensure your little ones utilize those skills as best they can – an important concept that will carry them through their entire lives.



3s – Discoverers ~ Theme: A Visit to the Hundred Acre Wood

School Age Explorers ~ Theme: Operation Exploration

~ **Let's Explore Communication** ~

Communication is one of the most important skills a child learns. It is a skill that comes naturally, but one which can be greatly enhanced by others. Our role is to talk and listen, and to listen and talk so that conversations become a part of their lives.

At this age

Children
Birth to
One:

- Look toward others talking to them and make eye contact
- React to sounds they hear, especially talking, singing, and reading
- Listen and respond to simple directions, poems, and rhymes
- Express their thoughts with gestures, babbling, cooing, and giggling

Talk slowly, clearly and use repetition when talking to your baby. Non-verbal communication and sign language are great ways to connect!

At this age...

Children
One to
Two:

- Understand more of what they see and hear
- Identify familiar faces, animals, and objects with words
- Reply to requests made of them with "yes" or "no"
- Learn the rules of communication by modeling adults around them

Provide plenty of opportunities for your little one to practice their developing communication skills by introducing rhymes, songs, and stories each day.

At this age

Children
Two to
Three

- Are ready to be part of the "chatter" around them
- Eagerly follow directions when stated in words they understand
- Listen to everything that is spoken around them
- Practice saying new words all day, every day

Remind children to "use their words" throughout the day, especially when they begin to cry out. Talk to them about everything that is going on around them.

At this age

Children
Three to
Four

- Are ready to start a conversation with other "talkers"
- Ask questions which start with "Why?", "Where?", "How?" and "What?"
- Enjoy answering questions about what they are learning
- Enjoy practicing many of the rules of speech

Repeat children's questions back to them and they will give you the answer. This exercise gives them numerous opportunities to practice talking.

At this age

Children
Four to
Five

- Are eager to be part of one-on-one conversations
- Listen with interest to what others are saying so they can respond
- Wait patiently until it is their time to share
- Enjoy listening to stories with plenty of details

Read new stories with children every day to broaden their vocabulary. Be part of the conversations they start. Introduce and define new words daily.

Communication is the foundation on which all relationships are built.
Our role is to model and promote meaningful communication.

Let's communicate as we play "I Say, You Say"

"I Say, You Say" is a great way to teach children the art of conversation. The key skill that requires plenty of practice is "turn-taking." This game begins with one individual saying a word and the other saying a word that goes with it. For instance, I say "chocolate" and the child says "ice cream." . As children's vocabulary develops, sentences can be used. Take time and take turns playing "I Say, You Say" with your little one. Play anywhere you are and play as often as you can. Keep in mind, that it is important to "teach" children how to use words as they communicate with others.

Wordless story books are another great way to encourage children to use their developing communication skills. This type of book promotes:
